Season's greetings! It is hard to believe but 2020 is FINALLY coming to an end! Development of the coronavirus vaccine has been completed in record time and is now being distributed throughout the country. My hope for 2021 is that we finally beat this virus and are able to return to some semblance of normalcy.

The ACEC/MD Legislative Business Agenda was unveiled during this year's Legislative Kick-off Program on November 19, 2020. This year our agenda includes three major priorities including Duty to Defend, Transporta-

tion funding and the Transportation Trust Fund, and Qualifications Based Selection (QBS). We were fortunate to have as our featured speaker Delegate Vanessa Atterbeary (District 13), Vice Chair of the House Judiciary Committee. Delegate Atterbeary is a strong supporter of our Duty to Defend legislation, which is sponsored by Delegate Jon Cardin in the House. In the Senate, our bill is sponsored again this year by Senator Chris West, who has been a longtime advocate of our industry's business interests.

Also provided that day was an individual pledge form for CEPAC, ACEC/MD's Maryland Political Action Committee. If you do not already contribute, please consider making a pledge. We have a way to go to meet our pledge goal for the year. I am extremely pleased, however, to announce that for the 16th straight year we have met our ACEC/PAC (federal) goal by raising \$23,550. ACEC/PAC has grown from \$300,000 in the 2002 election cycle to over \$900,000 this year alone, which puts ACEC in the top 2% of PACs in the nation, and enables our message to be heard in Washington. Thank you to everyone who helped us achieve this goal!

Due to COVID-19, our Legislative Action Day, which is normally held in January, has turned into a Legislative Action Strategy, where we will be setting up targeted

virtual legislative visits to emphasize the importance of our business agenda priorities. Please plan on attending some of these meetings, especially if we are meeting with your Delegate or Senator. It is important that we try to have at least one representative who resides in the district of the legislator in these meetings. One task that all firms' representatives can do is send to ACEC/MD the districts where their employees live and the district where your office is located.

This program included educators from area universities in a panel discussion on how the pandemic has affected recruiting today and into the future. ACEC/MD ROLLS OUT 2021 LEGISLATIVE AGENDA

ACEC/MD officially kicked off the 2021 political season on November 19th at the organization's virtual Legislative Breakfast. At this event, we were pleased to welcome featured speaker Judiciary Committee Vice Chair Delegate Vanessa Atterbeary, who expressed support for our Duty to Defend legislation that will be considered in her committee. Delegate Atterbeary is a practicing attorney, who often encounters uninsurable indemnification clauses in her daily activities.

In addition to the Duty to Defend legislation that mirrors legislation recently passed in North Carolina that ties the duty to court determined proximate cause, the Business Agenda for the General Assembly Session will champion the need to modify the transportation funding formula and promote continued support of QBS when federal or state funds are used for design projects.

Duty To Defend - Equity and Fairness

WHAT IS THE ISSUE?

As a matter of public policy, Maryland law currently voids some forms of broad-based indemnification clauses in contracts relating to construction-projects. Many contracts still require A/E firms and design professionals to indemnify and to assume a duty to defend various other parties with respect to claims caused by others but which the design professional has no legal liability.

Modification to Maryland statutory language is needed to ensure that A/E firms and design professionals are not required to pay for or assume upfront duty to defend claims caused by others, through no fault of the design professional, so that such risks are fairly borne by the responsible parties.

WHY ARE THESE CHANGES IMPORTANT?

- Professional Liability Insurance does not provide coverage for legal fees and costs incurred to defend other parties when there's no established negligence or legal liability of the insured design professional. (In other words, it is uninsurable).
- Small businesses could be bankrupted by the current requirement.
- A design professional's responsibility for claims arising from A/E services should be consistent with established legal principles for professional liability.
- Other states have recognized that limiting such risks in the professional services context is good public policy.

The modifications proposed in no way prevent an owner from recovering damages caused by the fault or negligence of a design professional.

Legislative Action Required

Amend Section 5-401 of the Courts and Judicial Proceeding Article, Annotated Code of MD to void an upfront duty to defend and make indemnification unenforceable unless the design professional is the proximate cause of the injury/ loss/damage. This would fairly assign liability to the responsible party.

MARYLAND'S TRANSPORTATION TRUST FUND

BALANCE, STABILITY & SUSTAINABILITY

WHAT IS THE ISSUE?

The revenue generated from the gasoline tax is the major funding source for Maryland's Transportation Trust Fund (TTF). These funds fall short regularly and no longer meet the transportation infrastructure needs of the state. As a result, existing transportation facilities will continue to deteriorate including bridges, roadways, and mass transit systems. This is a dangerous prospect for the citizens of Maryland. If the revenue is not generated from the TTF for these critical repairs, the transportation system of the future will be in jeopardy. It is in the State's best interest to ensure funding levels in the TTF are at a level to sufficiently provide safe, effective and efficient travel. Further, this will ensure we can compete economically and help provide jobs for Marylanders.

WHY ARE THESE CHANGES IMPORTANT?

- To protect the TTF revenues in times where market disruptions adversely impact travel. Lack of a formula that will prevent TTF revenue from falling below a pre-determined level – a "floor" – when unique circumstances are presented (such as the pandemic's impact on fuel tax collections, gasoline prices and commuting) in the current gasoline tax is a structural deficiency in the current legislation and the provision for alternate sources of revenue are not provided.
- Budget shortfalls are now significant. The revenue stream to the TTF is based on an increasingly antiquated formula reliant on gas-powered vehicles. Increasing market acceptance of hybrid and electric vehicles further reduces gas tax revenues.
- Maryland is behind other states in the mid-Atlantic regarding transportation investment. These states have implemented a multi-model, approach to funding both roads and transit.
- There is no sustainable revenue source for transit. Inherent limitations with cost recovery have never been sufficiently addressed.
- System preservation funding is at-risk. Maintenance funding for highways, bridges and transit has been dramatically cut, leading to concerns over public safety.

Legislative Action Required

Three primary concerns -First, Address the structural deficiency (no floor) in House Bill 1515, Transportation Infrastructure Investment Act of 2013. Second, Correct the fuel tax from a wholesale levy to a more efficient retail levy "at the pump. " Third, revise the formula for reliance on vehicle gasoline sales which inherently does not recognize the hastening market shift to fuel efficiency and alternative powered vehicles to a formula which does recognize this market shift.

QUALIFICATIONS BASED SELECTION (QBS)

Both federal and Maryland state procurements use a Qualifications Based Selection (QBS) method to procure professional design services for their projects.

WHAT IS THE ISSUE?

In the interest of public safety, both the federal and state government long ago mandated. Qualifications Based Selection as the method to select architects and engineers. Federal and state funds are used by many local jurisdictions for infrastructure projects. Some of these jurisdictions are using a low bid system to select design services related to these initiatives.

Action Required

Encourage all local jurisdictions in Maryland to use the QBS process to select professional design firms when federal or State funds are used to pay for the services.

WHY ARE THESE CHANGES IMPORTANT?

- Qualifications Based Selection leads to higher quality services on public infrastructure projects. Quality professional engineering services are in the best interests of public safety.
- QBS ensures that the most qualified team is selected for the work.
- It provides for consideration of all teams based on past performance.
- Selecting the most qualified firm likely results in better design and construction savings.

WHY A LEGISLATIVE INTEREST?

- Important issue among Architectural/ Engineering Firms.
- State legislators can encourage local jurisdictions to advertise through a QBS process.

## TRANSPORTATION FUNDING LEVELS PROJECTED TO TAKE DRAMATIC DROP

Recognizing the need to have solid numbers demonstrating the steep reduction in the CTP, as advised by MDOT SHA, ACEC/MD recently made an official PIA request. We very much appreciate the transparency and partnering spirit demonstrated by MDOT SHA Administrator Smith, and will use these numbers to explain to the General Assembly and the public the need to take action now.

Dear Mr. Otradovec:

The Maryland Department of Transportation State Highway Administration (MDOT SHA) is in receipt of your request (827160) pursuant to the Maryland Public Information Act, General Provisions Article (GP), § 4-101 at sag., Annotated Code of Maryland. Specifically, you requested:

"Historical, five-year record of actual planning and preliminary engineering program expenditures, exclusive of construction costs, plus the same expenditures programmed for the current CTP period."

Your request is approved. Please see attached for the approved requested record.

GP § 4-206 authorizes MDOT to charge for time incurred to prepare, search, and review documents after the first two hours of work. Since the request was less than the two free hours to fulfill, there is no charge.

The MDOT SHA now considers this request closed.

You have the option to refer any concerns about this determination to the Public Access Ombudsman pursuant to GP § 4-1B-01 et seq. Pursuant to GP § 4-362, you are entitled to seek judicial review of this decision.

For efficiency reasons and to keep operational costs as low as possible, we encourage all requesters to submit their PIA requests through the MDOT online form, which can be found at www.mdot.maryland.gov. Click on the About tab at the top and their Public Information Act. You will find all PIA Representative contact information and other helpful information.

#### BIG INDUSTRY WINS IN STIMULUS BILL

It was a long time coming, but last evening Congress finally approved a second round of stimulus funding as part of its final FY2021 appropriations package. The legislation is the second-largest stimulus in American history, second only to the CARES Act. And like the CARES Act, the bill has several provisions that ACEC has strongly lobbied on for months with the support of our MOs and members. While the bill is not perfect and does not address the FAR credit issue on PPP loan forgiveness, it provides support to American small businesses, state transit agencies, and working families when they need it most.

Our advocacy team has prepared a detailed summary of the key provisions in the COVID-19 Relief and Consolidated Appropriations Act. Make sure to follow us on social media and subscribe to the Last Word blog for any breaking developments and analysis to come.

#### Here are the bill's highlights:

- Clarifies that expenses covered by Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) loan forgiveness are tax-deductible business expenses. This was a top priority for ACEC advocacy since the PPP program was put in place earlier this year.
- Provides a second PPP forgivable loan for qualifying businesses with 300 or fewer employees.
- Extends and expands the refundable Employee Retention Tax Credit (ERTC) and provides that employers
  who receive PPP loans may still qualify for the ERTC for wages that are not paid for with forgiven PPP
  proceeds.
- Provides \$14 billion in supplemental funding for transit agencies, \$10 billion in highway funding for state DOTs, \$2 billion for airports, and \$1 billion for Amtrak. This has been a focus of ACEC throughout 2020. ACEC joined a coalition of groups to push for increased funding to state DOTs, issued action alerts to our members and engaged in direct lobbying with the House and Senate on this issue.
- Includes the Water Resources Development Act (WRDA), which authorizes \$9.9 billion in federal funds for 46 U.S. Army Corps of Engineers projects.
- Makes permanent the Section 179D energy-efficient commercial buildings tax deduction and extends the tax credits for wind, solar, and other renewable resources. This was a key policy goal for ACEC that we highlighted during our 2019 legislative convention.
- Extends through 2025 the Employer Participation in Repayment Act (ERPA), which allows employers to provide up to \$5,250 in student loan payments without it being a taxable benefit to the employee. This has been a key ACEC advocacy issue that was also highlighted during our 2019 fly-in.
- For our federation's 52 state and metro Member Organizations, the bill now makes 501(c)6 organizations eligible for PPP loans if the organization meets certain criteria related to spending on lobbying.

These are some big wins for our industry, representing the culmination of months of grass-roots advocacy by our member firms under the leadership of our Government Affairs team in DC, backed by our state execs. Yet there is still more to do.

Our state and municipal clients are hurting and need federal aid beyond the highways and transit plus ups in this bill. We need a long-term infrastructure bill that addresses real revenues. Thankfully, recent remarks by President-elect Joe Biden and his nominee for Secretary of Transportation Pete Buttigieg point to infrastructure as a priority for the new administration.

We have already begun to work with the Biden transition teams who are preparing for January's Inaugural. We are establishing ACEC as a trusted advisor that can provide important industry perspectives to incoming policymakers on the issues that matter to our member firms. We are bullish on 2021 and look forward to becoming an even more impactful organization in the New Year.

2020 has been tough, and the holiday season has been subdued for many of us, but we can take pride in how well the engineering community has performed during these challenging times. And I am confident that we will continue to lead the way in the New Year.





## PACE OF JOB GROWTH SLOWS: "V" SET TO BECOME A "W" BY ANIRBAN BASU (SAGE POLICY GROUP)

U.S. payroll employment rose by 245,000 in November 2020, a figure that would be delightful under normal circumstances but was disappointing under current ones. Today's job growth numbers were the weakest since the economy began its healing process in May and well below the consensus that America would add closer to half a million jobs in November.

U.S. payroll employment is 9.8 million below February's level, when the pandemic brought the lengthiest economic expansion in American history to a premature ending. At November's pace of job creation, it would take until March 2024 to achieve full recovery. Here's the problem. The next few months are set to be even slower in terms of job growth as economic lockdowns resume and the economy is hit with another supply shock.

Some will raise their hands and point out that the unemployment rate declined to 6.7% in November, a multi-month low. True, but even that bright spot is blighted by the fact that the decline was largely attributable to a 400,000 person decline in the labor force. The labor force participation rate fell to 61.5% in November, remaining at levels not observed since Gerald Ford was in office.

If it wasn't clear already, we're plummeting toward a second recession.

#### Three Key Takeaways

- 1. Local government educational employment (public schools) has decreased by 111,500 since September, and state government educational employment (colleges/universities) has fallen by 59,300 jobs over the same period. Many of these jobs will (presumably) snap back once a vaccine is distributed and in-person teaching resumes, but cutbacks will get worse before they get better as states and localities struggle to balance budgets.
- 2. The food services and drinking places sector lost another 17,400 jobs on net in November. At this point, there's not much left to say about the devastation to the restaurant industry, which will get worse as temperatures continue to dive and outdoor dining becomes impractical in much of the nation.
- 3. Retail trade lost 34,700 jobs in November. The transportation and warehousing segment added 145,000 jobs in November. Amazon is winning and will keep winning. They are really good at what they do.

#### What to Watch

Stimulus. We need stimulus. Stimulus, stimulus, stimulus. But even that may not prevent a second recession. Stimulus supports the demand side of the economy. We are facing a supply shock. If we shut it down, the economy recedes even if people have money to spend.

## COULD YOU LOSE YOUR JOB FOR REFUSING TO GET A COVID-19 VACCINE?

A vaccine for the coronavirus is expected to be available soon. But that does not mean that everybody will choose to get it.

A Gallup poll released last month showed that while 58% of Americans said they would get an FDA-approved COVID vaccine that is made available free of cost; 42% said that they would not.

So what about that 42%?

What happens if their employer insists that they get the vaccine and they refuse? Does the law protect them or does it protect their employer?

"An employer who does mandate a vaccine comes under the Americans with Disabilities Act. So that is considered a medical examination. And they (the employer) have to give certain accommodations. And those include a strongly-held religious belief or sincerely-held religious belief, as well as any kind of medical condition that might make taking the vaccine unsafe for them. So the answer is it depends on why they were refusing the vaccine," Diane Hoffman, director of the Law and Health Care Program at the University of Maryland School of Law, told MarylandReporter.com on Thursday. Hoffman added: "So if they were refusing it for those two reasons then the employer is going to be liable. Otherwise, they are probably not protected from losing their position."

Jessica Waltman, Vice President of Compliance at MZQ Consulting, LLC. in Pikesville, echoed similar sentiments.

"Assuming federal guidance stays the same, employees who just don't want to take vaccination because of medical concerns or non-religious personal reasons would not qualify for legal protection. If an employee claims that they cannot be vaccinated due to religious or medical reasons (like an allergy to one of the vaccine's agents), then their employer could require an attestation or medical documentation. The business would also have to provide a reasonable alternative, such as always wearing an employer-provided N-95 mask while at work."

Waltman added: "Based on what we know now, an employer would be able to mitigate liability by following these rules. Once vaccines are approved and in widespread distribution, businesses could also encourage employees to access the vaccine by offering it at work, similar to the way many offer flu-shot clinics now. Also, group health insurance plans will provide employees with free access to the vaccine as long as the national public health emergency is in effect. Federal rules on the subject make it clear that COVID-19 vaccines must be covered before any deductible and without any cost-sharing requirements, even if you go out-of-network to get it."





## COULD YOU LOSE YOUR JOB FOR REFUSING TO GET A COVID-19 VACCINE? (CONTINUED)

Del. Brian Chisholm (R-Anne Arundel), who sits on the Health and Government Operations Committee, said employer vaccine mandates are likely to trigger a significant number of lawsuits.

"Absolutely. If there's one thing we are not short of in Maryland or in the United States its attorneys and lawyers who are willing to take anything to lawsuits. So I do think that if there are people who are in a situation where they feel like their employer is forcing them to take a vaccine they don't want to take-and then they fire them or force them into a situation they are not comfortable with-then sure-I think there is going to be lawsuits coming."

Gov. Larry Hogan outlined Maryland's draft vaccination plan in an interview with ABC's Good Morning America on Thursday morning. The state submitted the plan to the CDC in October.

"Our plan, which we submitted to the CDC, prioritizes the most vulnerable, so our front line healthcare workers, our nursing homes, then first responders, and as they come in, we just start working our way down that pyramid of a list. And so we're hoping to get maybe 300,000 [vaccines] by the end of December and then hopefully it's going to really ramp up from there as production starts to accelerate."

There are 205,399 confirmed cases of COVID-19 in Maryland as of Thursday morning, according to the state's Department of Health, and 4,606 people in Maryland have died from the virus. The state's positivity rate is at 7.68%, which is well above CDC recommended guidelines for containment. Maryland has conducted more than 4.5 million COVID-19 tests.

Nearly 200,000 new cases of COVID-19 were reported nationwide on Wednesday.
